

Newsletter 196 has a bit for everyone, but is particularly strong in the fields of African Languages and Natural History. The latter category might be further subdivided, because there are outstanding works on Lepidoptera, Shells, Ichthyology, Botany and veld types. Look out for the foremost monographs on southern African moths and butterflies, by Pinhey and Pennington respectively. Take note, also, of Kilburn and Rippey's Sea Shells of Southern Africa, Southern African Epiphytic Orchids by Ball and van de Ruit, works on Fynbos in general and Renosterveld in particular. In the Travel section are two titles that might equally have been placed in Natural History. These are Rookmaaker's The Zoological Exploration of Southern Africa 1650-1790, and Allan Wright's Valley of the Ironwoods. In the Eastern Cape section, a rare centenary history of Uitenhage is worth appreciating, as is The 1820 Settlers: An Illustrated Commentary. Enjoy browsing through the entire list. We feel sure there will be something to interest you.

In particular, the problem of vowel-commencing radicals and of relatives derived from verbs will be considered in detail as C. M. Doke in his Text-Book of Zulu Grammar does not cover all the







(Doke Collection, p. 244; not in Murphy & Goff) "Until Dr. Jacob Nhlapo launched his campaign for Southern Bantu linguistic unity, few people had seriously considered the possibility of an orthographic system which would cover both the Nguni and Sotho groups, the feeling being that such unity lay in the realms of wishful thinking in view of the virtual impossibility of achieving unity within the groups. The present article is an attempt to combine the experience of past efforts into a system



Zulu poems by Benedict Wallet Vilakazi. Vilakazi, born Groutville 1906, died Johannesburg 1947, was a Zulu poet, novelist, scholar, educationist and lecturer. In 1933, he became teacher in Zulu, history and Latin at Ohlange Institute, founded by Dr. John L. Dube. Subsequent academic distinction took him to the University of the

Witwatersrand. During the twelve years of his academic achievement, his name became a household word amongst his people. (Dictionary of South African biography, Volume I, page 846). R275 / £12,50 14052.





"During the first half of 1820 twenty-one British transports under command of the Navy were making their way across the Atlantic, engaged in an unusual, if not unique, mission. They were not about their usual business of moving troops. They were

transporting some four thousand individuals, from various parts of the British Isles, to an area vaguely defined as South-east Africa. This book, devised and written by a team of acknowledged authorities on the history of English-speaking South Africa, recounts the sometimes dramatic history of this large group of settlers. Chapters are of two kinds, attempting rather different things: first, those which aim to keep the reader aware of the larger social and historical context of which the 1820 Settlement is part; second, accounts of the struggles of the Settlers themselves, viewed at close quarters, and using their own words where possible. The value of the text is greatly


enhanced by nearly 350 illustrations, many of which have not been published before. These have been chosen from contemporary sources, or from photographs of relics or buildings which have survived. The captions do more than describe the pictures; they provide important information not in the text itself. This book is a fitting tribute to the 1820 Settlers and the very important role they came to play in their new country." R990 / £45,00 14044.



The family was subsequently closely associated with the affairs of the town, and nephew Alfred James Sellick became president of the Newspaper Press Union. This book is a vivid celebration of the earliest European settlement on the eastern frontier of the Cape colony. Uitenhage is now known as Kariega. R1870 / £85,00 14033.



Some have become famous, such as the wrecking of the Grosvenor or the Birkenhead, while others are generally unknown. In this book, the result of more than eight years' diligent and

painstaking research, the author has brought together facts about close on a thousand wrecks that have occurred on the coast of South Africa, from the earliest recorded Portuguese wreck, that of a vessel of which the name has been lost to us, in 1505, to the latest notable shipwreck, that of the Daeyang Family, in 1986. All aspects of shipwreck and salvage are covered in the text and illustrations, beginning with a historical overview. The causes of shipwrecks, cargoes, treasure hunts, the development of salvage techniques, and underwater archaeology are discussed. The lively, authoritative main text, which will delight the expert and the layman alike, is copiously illustrated with photographs (many of which have never previously been published), maps, paintings and line drawings. Many text boxes have been included, containing interesting side-notes to the main text, clarifications or broader perspectives. The book is rounded off with an Alphabetical, Chronological and Geographical list of all the noteworthy shipwrecks that have occurred on our coast. 

As the diary chronicles one man's isolated war so the

parallel commentary supplies the reader with a more comprehensive guide to the war. Designed to correspond accurately with what is happening in Private Tucker's world, the annotations provide a wealth of intelligent, researched facts, observations and asides. 

unique situation of holding full correspondent's passes from both the Boer and British armies. He travelled widely, developing a sympathy and admiration for the Boers. Of particular interest is his description of Machadodorp when it was the capital of the Transvaal and his interview with President Kruger just prior to Kruger's departure for the Netherlands. 

Besides being an invaluable reference book for Southern African wild flower lovers, it will be of great assistance to botanists all over Africa, as many of the species and genera are widely distributed. In addition it will be welcomed by orchid lovers throughout the world. Although the epiphytic orchids from the southern regions of Africa lack the variety of colours, shapes and size of their cousins from the tropics of Asia and the Americas, they often compensate in charm by delicate structuring in virginal whites and creams and with neat arrangements of the flowering spikes." It was this question and the lack of any satisfactory answer to it which prompted Dr. Gelfand to write this book which for the first time throws light on this important aspect of Livingstone's life. The story of Livingstone the Doctor cannot, however, be told in isolation. His medical work was an essential part of his work as a missionary explorer. In Livingstone the Doctor, therefore, the reader will easily recognize the Livingstone of famous memory. The author, who is a specialist in the field of African studies, brings to his task a possibly unrivalled knowledge of the problems faced daily by

A lavishly-produced publication, and the standard work on the subject. "The 18th century witnessed a new interest in African animals. Research was undertaken at the Cape of Good Hope by seven explorers. All their books, manuscripts, and drawings concerning mammals and birds are listed and discussed in this publication. Many of the contemporary drawings, largely unpublished, have been included. The mammals were first studied carefully by Robert Jacob Gordon, Commander of the Cape garrison. His large collection of animal drawings known as the 'Gordon Atlas' is our main source of information on his field of interest. A considerable number of examples from his collection appear for the first time in the present book. Two Swedes, Anders Sparrman and Carl Peter Thunberg, applied the methods of Linnaeus to their work; their work is thoroughly analysed. The field of interest of J.R. Forster (who with George Forster is known from Cook's voyage of

discovery), Francis Masson and William Paterson was much less defined. The sources available to the author are discussed and some of their drawings reproduced. François Levaillant was the pioneer of African ornithology. His voluminous books are confusing due to a mixture of fact and fantasy, but well known for the beauty of the plates. This book gives details on four collections of more than 300 mammals and birds drawings connected with Levaillant's research, hitherto totally unmentioned in other publications. Many examples are illustrated, 16 of them in colour. The zoological contents of the material left by these seven explorers and by their predecessors are analysed for all mammals and birds emphasising the history, taxonomy, nomenclature and zoogeography. 
